With warm daytime temperatures and cool nights, the sap has started to flow, possibly the earliest start in 20 years. Could it be that we are going to get an early start in our garden adventures for the coming year? Those planning our Plant Sale would welcome an early spring, especially after the cool temperatures that lasted well into May last year. Getting an earlier start would give us much larger, healthier plants ready for potting up, and giving plenty of time for writing a good description of the plants before arriving at the plant depots.

Spring also brings the Carolinian District 6 Spring Workshop and Flower Show, this year hosted by the Delhi and District Horticultural Society. A few years ago, my wife and I purchased a number of daylilies from a proving garden in P.E.I. to add to our collection. They are all coming along nicely and this year we should see a good performance from them as they mature in our garden. Well, all except one, which seems to have disappeared. And of course, that was the one I was most interested in. I hope we don't have to wait as long as that *Campion* to see blossoms from this particular daylily.

OUT ON A LIMB

I was surprised to see that my *Hamamelis* had started to colour seven weeks ahead of schedule.



Its first full blooms usually coincide with St. Paddy's day, so I'm hopeful that I'll be able to start the lettuce and peas in early March instead of April. My mouth is watering just thinking about my first harvest. This weekend, I'll be preparing my catalogue seed orders. And once again, I'm going to try my best to not exceed my usual 75-acre coverage.

For the last couple of years, I've been disappointed late in the summer that I hadn't planted more annuals. With that in mind, here are four that I hope to try in my garden this summer:

Zinnia 'Magellan'™ Coral (30-35cm), an All American Selection. It has a good strong colour that doesn't fight with others, so it will be easy to plant around the garden. And once they start to bloom, they just don't quit.

For the rotten soil next to my parking pad, I am going to try *Ursinia anethoides* (40cm) – a native to South Africa that is similar to *Gazania*. It thrives in hot, poor soil and sports the most marvellous orangey daisy-like flowers held up on fine wiry stems.

Who can resist planting flowers for hummingbirds? Not me. *Salvia coccinea* 'Summer Jewel Red' (51cm) flowers in just 50 days and also is an AAS winner for 2012. Apparently, if I leave the seed pods on I'll be rewarded with lots of hungry gold finch visitors.

After following the impressive display of *Gomphrena* in the roadside strip outside of Whole Foods Market last summer, I decided I had to try some. 'Audray Bicolour Rose' (51cm) comes in packages of 50 seeds. Even with the noted germination rate of 40-50%, I'm hopeful that I'll have some to share with friends.

May this warm weather continue, and may spring be just around the corner. See you at the next meeting.
